Austin, Texas, March 29.—The following officers of the Nacogdoches County Interscholastic League, elected by the teachers at their institute, have been received and duly recorded in the State Office of the League, which is conducted by the University of Texas:

The officers have entire charge of the county meet which will be held during the month of March, and winners in the various contests selected which will represent the county at the district meet, which will be held in April. The League, as a state organization, has been conducted since 1910, and the next state meet will be the Twelfth Annual State Meet held under its auspices. Last year the League numbered 4095 member-schools, and had 194 county organizations. Advice from the schools of this county indicate that the work will be taken up enthusiastically during the ensuing season, and the county's share of honors captured at the district meet.

### MARY PAY TRIBUTE TO MRS. S. A. RICHARDSON

All Nacogdoches was made sad last Wednesday when it became known that Mrs. S. A. Richardson, one of the city's most noble characters, had passed away. Her death occurred about 5:30 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. The funeral was held Thursday afternoon at four-thirty o'clock from the family residence on Church Street. Rev. Higgins of the Christian church conducting the services at the home and concluding them at the grave.

Mrs. Richardson, nee Sarah Alice Perkins, was a native of Tennessee, being born in that state on May 15, 1850 and was nearing her 72nd birthday when death claimed her. She was the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. H. Perkins, a very prominent family of Tennessee who came to Texas in 1854 and settled in Rusk county. On June 3, 1868, she was united in marriage to Edward Everett Richardson and to this union two children were born, one son and one daughter. During her husband's life time, which was but a few years, they resided in Rusk and Cherokee counties. After her husband's death, which occurred in Cherokee county, she with her children returned to Rusk county and lived with her parents, moving to Nacogdoches with them in 1893. Her parents died some years ago and are both buried in Oak Grove cemetery.

She had been confined to her bed practically all of the time for the past eight months and never once was she heard to murmur or complain of her lot. Her many friends often visited her during her long illness and she was always bright and cheerful and hoping to regain her health. You could not know her without loving her. Her heart was filled with love for everyone, and she was always eager to uplift and sympathize with those in distress.

God has blessed the world and made it a better place to live in, through the life of this good woman who never lacked appreciation of the beauties of earth or failed to express it; she always looked for the best in everyone and always gave the best that was in her. Her life was an inspiration, her memory a benediction.

Early in life she united with the Christian church and was a very devout christian. In health she was a very active and faithful church worker, and was never tiring in her work for her Master. Her devotion to her children and their devotion to her was truly touching. Her son has helped to nurse her during her long illness and has watched so tenderly over her. Her daughter who moved to Houston about a year ago, often visited her and hoped until the end that she might be spared them longer.

Her funeral was largely attended, almost the entire community gathering at the home and grave to pay tribute for the last time to this good woman. The floral offerings were many and beautiful and entirely covered the new made grave.

In addition to the son and daughter, Mr. Charlie Richardson and Mrs. Allan Seale of Houston, she is survived by the following brothers and sisters: Messrs. Will and Charlie Perkins of this city; Mesdames B. F. Thompson, Devaux, G. P. Garrison, all of Austin; Mrs. J. T. Usrey of Dallas. Mrs. Thompson reached the city Sunday before her death but her other sisters were unable to come on account of illness in their own families. Two grand children, Everett and Elizabeth Seale and several nieces and nephews also survive her.
